



Holy Gospel John 2:1-11

Clergy The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

On the third day there was a wedding in Cana of Galilee, and the mother of Jesus was there. Jesus and his disciples had also been invited to the wedding. When the wine gave out, the mother of Jesus said to him, "They have no wine." And Jesus said to her, "Woman, what concern is that to you and to me? My hour has not yet come." His mother said to the servants, "Do whatever he tells you." Now standing there were six stone water jars for the Jewish rites of purification, each holding twenty or thirty gallons. Jesus said to them, "Fill the jars with water." And they filled them up to the brim. He said to them, "Now draw some out, and take it to the chief steward." So they took it. When the steward tasted the water that had become wine, and did not know where it came from (though the servants who had drawn the water knew), the steward called the bridegroom and said to him, "Everyone serves the good wine first, and then the inferior wine after the guests have become drunk. But you have kept the good wine until now." Jesus did this, the first of his signs, in Cana of Galilee, and revealed his glory; and his disciples believed in him.

Sermon

### The Nicene Creed

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.





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## \*MUSIC NOTES

Today, St. James' Racial Justice and Reconciliation Commission introduces a year long series with the theme of "Open and Curious" inviting us to consider anew the history of racism in America. Through the arts and various study opportunities we are invited to listen to the stories of those who have experienced racism in their own lives. African-American music has provided a rich and profound impact on the American experience. During the times of slavery, 1620 - 1865, blacks were only allowed 1 day off from work - Sunday. Song singing became integral to the African-American worship experience on that 1 day a week of freedom. The prelude music today, "Steal away to Jesus, I ain't got long to stay here", was a typical song that had a clever double meaning - 1) the desire to go to heaven to be with Jesus, and 2) the desire to leave the shackles of slavery and secretly get on the road to freedom to the northern abolitionists. Harriet Tubman would have sung this on her numerous trips north with escaped slaves. The next couple of weeks will feature music from the rich heritage of African-American culture. The closing hymn today was written for the 91st birthday of Abraham Lincoln in 1900 by James Weldon Johnson and set to music by his brother, J. Rosamund. In 1919, the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) dubbed it "the Negro national anthem" for its power in voicing a cry for liberation and affirmation for African-American people.
