Luke 4:14-21

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*Music Notes

Today, St. James' Racial Justice and Reconciliation Commission continues a yearlong series with the theme of "Open and Curious" inviting us to consider anew the history of racism in America. Through the arts and various study opportunities we are invited to listen to the stories of those who have experienced racism in their own lives. African-American music has provided a rich and profound impact on the American experience. During the times of slavery, 1620 - 1865, blacks were only allowed 1 day off from work - Sunday. Song singing became integral to the African-American worship experience on that 1 day a week of freedom. The next couple of weeks will feature music from the rich heritage of African-American culture. The opening hymn today was written for the 91st birthday of Abraham Lincoln in 1900 by James Weldon Johnson and set to music by his brother, J. Rosamund. In 1919, the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) dubbed it "the Negro national anthem" for its power in voicing a cry for liberation and affirmation for African-American people.



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
